Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD)

Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) is a neurological (brain) disorder that interferes with normal development of communication and social interaction. It typically appears in the first 3 years of life. Autism is often misunderstood.

Characteristics of ASD may include:

- Slow or no language development, or loss of language
- Repetitive speech
- Difficulty socializing
- Preference for being alone
- Odd, repetitive play or repeated body movements (i.e. rocking, hand flapping)
- Difficulty making eye contact
- Difficulty expressing needs
- Difficulty making transitions
- Over-sensitivity or undersensitivity to stimuli
- Tantrums
- Lack of appropriate fear
- Insistence on sameness
- Sensory differences

Autism Facts

- Autism is a neurological disorder that affects how people think, learn, play and communicate.
- Autism is a "spectrum" disorder meaning characteristics of autism can be
 present in a variety of combinations, from mild to severe. Autism Spectrum
 Disorders include "classic" Autism, Aspergers Syndrome, Pervasive Developmental Disorder Not Otherwise Specified, and the less common Rhett's
 Disease and Childhood Disintegrative Disorder.
- Autism is more common than childhood cancer, cystic fibrosis and multiple sclerosis combined.
- Autism occurs 4 times more often in boys than in girls.
- An estimated 1 in 110 children born today will be diagnosed with autism, as opposed to 1 in 10,000 in the late 1980s. (The reason behind the increase is unclear, but there are likely many contributing factors. Studies point to both possible genetic links and environmental factors.)
- Each person with autism is different.
- Autism is NOT a mental illness and is NOT caused by bad parenting.
- Children with autism are not unruly kids who choose to misbehave.
- People with autism want to socialize and have friends but need extra help.
- Autism is a lifelong disability but IS treatable.
